Join us in packing meals after the service on

Sunday July 9th, with the Rise Against Hunger organization. We are planning to pack 12,000 meals this year, and we need your help. There will be signup sheets in the Narthex next week. To defray the expenses we will have a free will offering at the event. People of all ages and abilities can help, there will be jobs for everyone, some will involve standing, walking, and others are done seated. We will begin about 11:30 and should finish in about an hour. There will be a free will offering to defray expenses, and we have support through the Market Share and Global Mission.

Here is an example of how the meal packing program can have important effects on those who are hungry. In response to extreme El Nino drought conditions that left nearly 23 million people in need of urgent humanitarian assistance, Rise Against Hunger started the Southern Africa School Feeding Initiative in early 2017 to meet the need of school age children facing hunger in the region. Through this project tens of thousands of students across Madagascar, Mozambique, Zambia, eSwatini, and Zimbabwe have been served by distributing volunteer packaged meals through school feeding programs that ensure children have access to education even during these extremely trying times. After several years of distributing these meals in Zimbabwe, the School Feeding Initiative




was able to transition to providing the resources and training necessary to grow enough food to supply the school feeding programs through farming initiatives in the local community. This project has established a self-sufficient model of school feeding so successful that excess food is able to be sold in local markets. Rise Against Hunger can fully exit the project in Zimbabwe this year knowing the food necessary to continue the school feeding program is being produced in the communities there and the project will be stewarded by local leaders. What started with meals packaged by volunteers like Highland, has become a sustainable source of food for the children and families we have served in Zimbabwe. 

Changemaker's Lab (VBS) is 2 weeks away and we could use a few household supplies. Drop off the following items by Tuesday, June 20th at the church office:

- 30 Cleaned, wrapper-free, clear, smooth 12 oz. glass jars (ex. pickle jars, jelly jars, etc.)
- 60 cleaned, wrapper-free, 64 oz. soda or juice bottles (preferably clear, but color is also ok)
- 60 cleaned, wrapper-free, 16 or 24 oz. soda bottles (preferably clear, but color is ok)
- 4 shoeboxes
- 12 clear, smooth 12 oz or greater drinking glasses or wine glasses
- Cornstarch (24 16 oz. containers)
- Conditioner (12 16 oz. bottles Dollar Store brands will work)
- Vegetable oil (15 48 oz containers any brand)
- White vinegar (8 128 oz bottles any brand)
- 10 adult sized lab coats (for donation or to borrow)

Pay it Forward! There are ways you can "pay it forward' by creating a legacy for Highland Presbyterian Church. These options below have the advantages of not reducing your current financial situation or income (perhaps even enhancing it) while in many cases allowing you to escape federal and state taxation.

Bequests are the easiest way to "pay it forward." Including a bequest in your will to Highland Presbyterian can take several forms. Cash Is easy to designate but runs the risk of reduced value due to inflation. Percentage of assets avoids the problem of the amount being eroded by inflation. Real Estate can provide a unique opportunity. The donor may transfer a home or other property. If it is a personal residence or farm, the donor can retain use of it during their lifetime.

Life insurance with Highland as the beneficiary ensures that a fixed sum goes to Highland. Often this is an "old" policy whose cash value has risen over the years and you may not realize its current value.

Appreciated assets transferred to Highland "cheat" our favorite Uncle. Many stocks and other securities have a value far in excess of original cost. Transferring these to Highland avoids the capital gains tax.

Charitable remainder trusts allow a future gift to Highland while receiving income during your lifetime. A trustee makes payments to you during your lifetime. When the income payments end the remaining assets go to Highland.

Retirement Plans have since January 2023 become increasingly important. Designate a charitable beneficiary such as Highland for retirement accounts such as IRAs, 401(k)/403(b) Keogh and others may reduce your income tax and those of your heirs.

Annuities take a variety of forms and should be individually tailored for your situation. All of them have a tax advantage, but their main benefit is to guarantee lifetime income for the owner. Annuities may be for a single life or for two. Remaining funds (if any) could go to Highland as a beneficiary.

Highland as a Plan or Policy Beneficiary Recent notes from the Stewardship Committee have emphasized the importance of checking employment-related retirement plans, IRAs, and life insurance policies to ensure that your beneficiary designations are up to date. Especially in cases where you believe that there are adequate provisions for loved ones, consider adding Highland as a beneficiary for a percentage of the assets. Most plan and policy administrators provide a way to make this change conveniently.
