



Highland Fall Sermon Series



The Book of Acts: Resilient Church, Resilient People

In Acts, Chapter 1, the resurrected Jesus ascends to heaven leaving the disciples confused and afraid. Staring up to heaven in sheer bewilderment, you can almost hear one of them ask this question: what's next? This fall, we are collectively asking, "What's next for Highland?" This is a question that is exciting and full of possibility. It is a question that gives us permission to dream and imagine. But it's also a question that can spark fear in us. It is natural for us to be afraid of the unknown and to feel discomfort with any kind of transformation. But the early church

needed to expand and evolve in order for it to grow. And grow it did! The reason why Highland exists is because the early church was resilient and faithful, carrying the message of the gospel to all corners of the earth. This fall, we're going to take a look at the early church movement through the lens of resilience. We're going to ask, "What makes a resilient church?" And we're going to take lessons from those early Christians who adapted and fought for the gospel to be shared and for faith communities to be formed. We will be applying those lessons to our dreaming process as we think about what's next for Highland. And, hopefully, we'll be applying them to other aspects of our lives where we need to show up as resilient leaders, forging ahead with both faith and hope. I invite you to join me this fall as we dive into the book of Acts and follow where God leads.

God's Plan Seekers (GPS) in Action! Over the past several months, a diverse and intergenerational group of members have been busy praying, listening, learning, and navigating what it means to be "people following Jesus". The mission of this team is to facilitate the determination of three to five God-sized goals for HPC through our collective reflecting on the past, thinking about the present, and dreaming for the future. In order to do this, the GPS team needs your help!



In September, October, and November, there will be three unique opportunities to gather all of us for facilitated congregational conversations. These conversations will be held following our Sunday services in the Fellowship Hall. They will be moderated, in small groups, by GPS team members from Noon to 1:30 pm on the following three dates: September 10, 2023 to reflect on "The Past"; October 15, 2023 to think about "The Present"; and November 12, 2023 to dream about "The Future".

In October, the GPS team will reach out to community partners to identify needs where Highland can help the most. In late November, we will collate the conversational findings and identify the three to five major goals that presented themselves throughout this process. A report of findings will be created, delivered to the Session, and presented to the congregation in the New Year.

By building upon our strengths and using the cross as our compass, we can continue to grow, deepen our relationships with the community, and serve God in potentially new ways. It is time for us to imagine anew and - with God's help - we, as a Congregation, will do just that! All voices are invited and needed as we undertake this discerning journey!

Highland has had a Market Share program for 29 years! During the last three of those years, Covid 19 changed a lot of things. One thing that hasn't changed is the need to combat hunger in Lancaster and the greater world. The Market Share program seeks to offer help tackling hunger and the need for fresh water. It is part of both the Local Outreach and Global Mission committees. Gift cards from Giant, Oregon Dairy, Stauffers or Weis are sold at our desk in the Narthex every Sunday. The cards are sold at a face value of \$50 or \$25. You use the card at that same face value, but we get a 5% return. That is the money that is sent away to help others. Over \$150,000 has already been given. These cards are easy to use and work like a debit card for anything sold by that store: your groceries, pharmacy scripts, garden supplies and flowers, restaurants, and gas. We would all like to help others but sometimes find it hard to fit into our lives, However, you do go buy groceries and other necessities on a regular basis. Consider that your use of the grocery gift cards we sell here---even one card a month--- will make a difference. No effort is too small to be of help to curb the hunger so prevalent in Lancaster and our world. **Please remember to visit the Market Share desk on Sunday mornings and join in the mission!**
