

World Communion Sunday, The first Sunday in October celebrates our oneness in Christ with all our brothers and sisters around the world. Paul tells us that we are to "discern the body" when we partake of Holy Communion, mindful that we note our relationship to all our brothers and sisters in Christ in the celebration. At Highland Church we celebrate this Sunday in several ways. We celebrate the Lord's Supper making sure that all members and guests are able to participate. We deploy teams of Highland Home Communion Servers to minister to ones who are unable to get to church due to health concerns or no longer being able to drive. We connect as partners with other members, guests and our partnership nested congregation from Kenya – The Imani Lighthouse Congregation,

World Communion Sunday (originally called Worldwide Communion Sunday) is a gift of the Presbyterian Church to the larger ecumenical church. The first celebration occurred at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA, in 1933 where Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr served as pastor. Dr. Kerr first conceived the notion of World Communion Sunday during his year as moderator of the General Assembly (1930). Dr. Kerr's younger son, the Rev. Dr. Donald Craig Kerr, who is pastor emeritus of the Roland Park Presbyterian Church in Baltimore, was sixteen in 1933. He has related that World Communion Sunday grew out of the Division of Stewardship at Shadyside. It was their attempt to bring churches together in a service of Christian unity—in which everyone might receive both inspiration and information, and above all, to know how important the Church of Jesus Christ is, and how each congregation is interconnected one with another.

Rev. Dr. Donald Kerr notes, "The concept spread very slowly at the start. People did not give it a whole lot of thought. It was during the Second World War that the spirit caught hold, because we were trying to hold the world together. World Wide Communion symbolized the effort to hold things together, in a spiritual sense. It emphasized that we are one in the Spirit and the Gospel of Jesus Christ."

Celebration of Worldwide Communion Sunday was adopted as a denominational practice in the Presbyterian Church (US) in 1936. Churches in other denominations were invited to celebrate with us from the beginning, but it wasn't until 1940 when the Department of Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches (a predecessor body of the National Council of Churches) promoted extending the celebration to several churches around the world that the practice became widespread. Today, World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world, demonstrating that the church founded on Jesus Christ peacefully shares God-given goods in a world increasingly destabilized by globalization and global market economies based on greed.

Peace & Global Witness Offering This is one of four special offerings collected by the Presbyterian Church USA. A gift to the Peace & Global Witness Offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of conflict and injustice across the world. Individual congregations are encouraged to utilize

up to 25% of this Offering to connect with the global witness of Christ's peace. Mid councils (the Presbytery and Synod) retain an additional 25% for ministries of peace and reconciliation. The remaining 50% is used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness. One example of how the offering is used is the Global Peacemakers program through the PCUSA. Ten people have been named Global Peacemakers in 2023. Carmen Diaz (a colleague we have worked with in El Salvador) is

among them. She is pictured with Joseph Rus a PCUSA mission coworker in El Salvador, Guatemala, and Honduras. Please support the Peace & Global Witness Offering this fall. The 25% of the offering will be used by our Matthew 25 committee to support a local Presbyterian African American. Highland will be collecting this offering the next few weeks.
